<p>Le Beau Pressoir Cabernet Franc <i>France, Pays d'Oc (vg)</i> Cabernet Franc is the father of Cabernet Sauvignon and Merlot and look how they turned out...</p>	6.30	8.90	25
<p>El Viejo del Valle Pinot Noir <i>Chile, Valle Central</i> We listed 'the Old Man of the Valley' because we've each aged about 10 years during lockdown and the wine was pretty decent</p>	6.90	9.70	27.50
<p>Vega del Rayo Rioja <i>Spain, Rioja (vg)</i> In Rioja they host an annual wine fight in the local town. We don't advocate violence, but we do advocate bloody good Rioja</p>	7.30	10	29
<p>Cruz Alta Malbec Reserve <i>Argentina, Mendoza (vg)</i> Malbec is grown hundreds of metres above sea level. We're not sure why they do that, but it'll make the steak melt in your mouth</p>	7.50	10.50	30
